So it's really easy to be principled about something. And then all of a sudden, what? Uh, that's possible. You can do that. But should you do that? today on the news, there was a story about some pictures circulating around where a middle school young girl's face was AI'd onto a naked body. You know, we knew that was going to happen.

I think there was a Blue Bloods episode where Frank Reagan, Saw himself saying stuff that he didn't do. There's a lot of good stuff that it can do, and there's a lot of bad stuff that it can do. Just as with any human being, it's all how it's used and who's it behind the wheel that there's a question. I see the problem with the writer's strike wanting to have things AI now, because I was ill informed.

I really was. But I'm not so Upset about that? Because any good writing, it can't really be done from a machine, because the passion in the heart is not in a machine. Anything behind it is a person who has intent. It's just like the images that were created. What is the intent? Is it to create beauty, or is it to create chaos?

Is it to help or harm? And that's all in our hands as human beings. So when I look at what AI can do, there's a lot of wonderful things that AI can do. Look at what it's doing for food allergies and medicine. It's dispassionate. It will look at

the algorithms. It will look at the genomes. It will look at the bacterium, and it will come to a logical conclusion with.

out any passion or moral compass to it. But that's the thing. It's the moral compass. AI will never have a moral compass unless we tell it to. It is artificial intelligence and artificial intelligence isn't about good and evil. It's about logic and binary. Ones and zeros as far as the pros.

It's efficient. It can automate tasks and take a lot of the drudgery out of our work. It leads to increase efficiency and productivity in all kinds of places. Being able to automate posts and stuff like that for me is huge. If I can get my, if I can sit for one hour and get all my posts set out for the next seven days, then my time is freed up to focus on my mom and my family.

That is a big deal to me. So I had to weigh the pros and cons and put my morality aside there. If I use it for good and I use it in an ethical and moral way and an honest way, then there's no problem with that. and it's a lot of, in the writer community, it's all about people are flooding the markets with AI written books.

Yes, they're crap! And I gotta be honest with you, even with my book, I used it to do an outline, to give me a step. anybody who's ever written a book, Where you start, you have a concept, but how do you lay it out? You have to lay out the steps and you have an outline. And sometimes that can take days because you have emotions attached to them.

But when you have use AI, give me an outline for this podcast, for instance. Okay, so what do you want to talk about? You give it, you have to give it the parameters. There. Humans are giving it the rules. So there's moral compass number one. Moral point. What are your points? What do you want to cover? AI isn't going to come up there, it's just going to be a blinking cursor.

You have to make it do something. And what you make it do is the whole crux of the argument. So back to the pros. I'm, I digress. Accuracy. AI systems are far more efficient with accuracy, to a great degree of accuracy. Reducing your errors, compared to human counterparts. I before E, except after C, I can say that 5 million times and I still screw it up.

Every freaking time. That makes a difference. So it's like when I'm working in the kitchen, I have a headset that's a cordless headset that I wear that I dictate to my laptop that's on the counter while I'm cooking dinner. When I do that, then I

have to go through and spell check it. What is the harm, honest to God, in having AI spell check me?

So that I can go and do the dishes and not have to worry about that. it's kind of like having an assistant. It's like having an assistant that has 40 bajillion times more brain cells than me. I don't see a problem with that. Yeah. Okay. So I'm cutting out a job. For an editor, I understand that, and it's not going to be, there's another point, it's not going to be as good as a professional editor, but you, there are trade offs.

Getting things done, getting things out, getting to the next step and the next step. Efficiently and quicker is more productive, AI can be more productive than hiring somebody, plus I don't have to wait for them to answer my calls. So that makes a huge difference. Cost reduction there too, by automating the tasks and processes, AI can lead the cost savings for me, I don't have to hire somebody to spell check me.

It makes a huge difference. I can have it put out my post so I don't need an assistant to put out my posts or to do my emails and things like that. That saves me a buttload of money, people. If you think of it in those terms, for the little guy that can't get signed by the big guy in the legacy publishing companies or have been dropped by legacy publishing companies, this is a game changer for writers.

It is a game changer, but it does not eliminate. The need for good content. You're never, ever going to get AI to write a bestseller because the plot twists and the passion and the heart. Is behind the words. And that's a critical component there. Plus AI is 20, 24, seven available. You don't have to wait for anybody to call it back.

Why wouldn't you use it? You have to live with the moral consequences. If you're going to write a bunch of crap and dump it all on Amazon. Okay. If you don't have a conscience, I bet you that's where karma is going to kick in and you're going to make like minimal. Does that make sense? Am I making sense?

Probably not. My point is that as far as a writer is concerned, I'm not worried about AI replacing me because a book can't write itself and AI is not gonna operate on its own. It needs commands. It needs direction. It needs prompts. And you can't prompt AI to be passionate about this paragraph in this particular way.

Only you as a writer can do that, okay? They can't interpret your feelings into text the way that you can. They can't understand what this thing that you went through that you're putting down on a page put you through and must be set in a tone of anguish or joy or anger, AI will never, ever be able to do that.

On a plus side, AI algorithms can personalize user experiences to a certain degree, such as recommendations and systems are targeting advertising or customer satisfaction, but that needs to be done with data. You, it has to analyze the clicks. It has to analyze how much you've sold, what you've sold, what's doing better.

That's just another process. that's just another thing, I'm going, I'm ranting too much on this one. But I think it needs to be said. It can look at the graphs, it can look at the peaks and valleys, but AI is never going to predict for sure where the stock market's going to go, where the dollar value is going to go, what company is going to blow your socks off so you should invest in it.

It analyzes data and makes it logical assumptions, but humans are the ones that dictate things. Whether Joe Schmo dropped off the box and the people can't get their product out in time leads to loss of income, that is still humans. We still have that we have to contend with. AI is never, ever, ever, ever going to replace humans influence over the outcomes.

Because we have to tell AI what to do. Now, as far as medical advancements are concerned, that's where AI, I think, is going to be hugely important, because it is dispassionate. It will look at all the angles and whatnot. If anybody's watched, Chicago Med, Lately, I haven't really, but they've got that, that hybrid OR thing that has that system that analyzes the scans and the blood work and all of that stuff and makes the recommendations to the doctor on what to do.

And there was this one episode, I think it was before the holidays, where the doctor knew That he couldn't do what the computer was doing because of what he saw right in front of him. And he saw the veins and the arteries and the amount of blood that was coming out and all of that. And he knew by having his hands in this person's gut that he could not take the path that the computer was telling because even though that was the optimum route, it was not the way this person was going to make it.

There was too many variables the computer could not see. And that's the same type of thing with AI in all facets. It will always have to have oversight, okay? It will always have to have oversight, even with safety measures. Of course, AI

can be used in hazardous environments, in dangerous situations to prevent our people from getting hurt, or our firefighters and our police and all of that.

They can make analyzations of what the best entry is based upon blueprints. But even there, What if somebody put a door where a window used to be, and it wasn't updated in the blueprints? There's always going to be human error, human involvement, human influence, and human logic, and instinct. Maybe that's what it is.

Instinct is a key. AI will never have instinct. It is all ones and zeros. It's all completely logic algorithm. It's never ever ever going to replace the human instinct and the human spirit. It just won't. Now, since we're going through the cons now, it's the, yeah, there will be some job displacement because it can replace some repetitive tasks, but still, that's the choice of the business owner on whether or not they want to displace the people or if they want the human hand touch to their work, do they want it all sterile and just Plunk out as many as they can as fast as they can.

Well, then you got a whole bunch of stuff and nobody's buying it because you've got a surplus. Isn't that what happened with all of the stockpiling of food back in? I wait, I'm going to my last podcast. I'm ranting again. See these things stick with me. I have my little pet peeves that drive me nuts. Now there is bias.

AI systems can inherit biases from their training data. Or their creators. Isn't that my point though? It's whoever's doing it. Oh, and that was another, I watch way too much TV in the middle of the night. It was, I think it was a, what was it? Was it a Chicago PD? It was a Chicago PD. Dick Wolf. Chicago PD, it was a, they used a new facial recognition that wasn't released to the public, but the programmers were biased.

They didn't tailor the facial recognition to distinguish African Americans as much as white Americans, and so they were seeing blank faces there. And so it was really super biased when it came to certain things. So you still need a human being to take a look at it. You cannot trust because there's not any moral compass on that one.

It's just, you gave me these features and there's 42 people that match those features. This is based on the data and the geography. This guy's your guy, but it wasn't, that wasn't his guy. If you saw that episode, I'm probably wrong, but it was a good episode and it proved my point that no matter what happens with AI, it all has to do with the person that's doing the data entry and giving the parameters and parameters are important.

More data needed. Now there is privacy concerns also. AI systems often rely largely on large amounts of data. And where do you get data? From people. So if you don't want your data out there, don't share your data. Because AI's gonna get it. Look, it's here kids. AI is here. It's not going anywhere.

All we can do is we can learn to adapt and change just like with everybody having a cell phone. Even now as you go to get gas and you slide your credit card through the slot, there's a chance that somebody else is going to get your data. That's all an issue. Privacy is really kind of non existent. And if you're not doing anything wrong, what the hell should you care?

You must secure yourself financially. Make sure all of your financial data is protected. Put all of those safety locks into place. Be aware. And don't be lackadaisical, monitor your stuff, make sure that you check your bank statements and check your credit card statements, be proactive in protecting yourself that way.

But AI isn't going to make that any different, it's just going to make it easier for people to do things. So if you are proactive on that, then you should be okay. We're all going to deal with it in one way or another, okay? I've had my identity stolen before. It's A pain in the ass, but they're getting better about dealing with it now.

So there are companies out there that all monitor things. And what is it? and the one thing that's going to be a pain in the ass is the dependency right now. What is it? They're not teaching cursive anymore in schools. Now you've got AI where a kid can say write my book report for me We that's gonna make and you're gonna have to have some good teachers that are gonna have to spot it But then again, that's going to come up with a whole other industry where we're

going to have scanners like we have the plagiarism scanners because the internet brought about people buying reports and stuff online.

So we will adapt with that in a positive way. That'll break up a whole new industry, parents, get your kids learning this stuff, computer sciences, and all of this stuff, it's going to be critical because this is where major job markets are going to be in the future. The ethical dilemmas are my thing. This is where I was like, I would never, ever use AI ever.

AI raises complex ethical questions such as the moral responsibility for AI actions or decisions and the potential consequences of AI development on society. I can see where it would be hugely helpful. Because, as for me, I don't have an assistant, I would love an assistant, my Echo is my assistant, my Google assistant is my Google assistant.

All the help that I can get, I appreciate. And this will help me run my business without having to hire a team. Because I can't afford a team right now. I don't, I don't even have time to talk to a team right now. It's a big deal there you have to be morally responsible and that's something that's lacking in today's society is morality and respect so I isn't changing any of that it's bringing that more to the forefront of what we have to do is human beings in the society is really instill that moral compass.

And ethical responsibility in our kids that doing the wrong thing has consequences and it will kick your ass in the long run. You have to be aware of those things. Trust me. I have insta karma. And whoever's using it and how they're using it. So that's the ethical dilemma part. The security risks, yeah, you gotta be careful because there's, there's gonna be all kinds of tools and all kinds of crap coming up on this stuff.

One of the reasons why I don't have a fancy new car is because I'm weird. I'm a freak. I admit it. I am one of those people. Cars can be hacked, and AI will make that easier. And that is what is impacting way more cries for social justice and quality and whatnot are being heard way more than if you screw up, you're going to pay for it because they're not, they're not really paying for it.

Consequences is a big deal. Yeah. And they're not being taught consequences because they're not consequences very much here in Los Angeles.

No. And still today. Okay. I'm not going to go political. Sorry. Okay. Shutting up on that one. The lack of transparency with AI is a con. That's a big con. Some algorithms are considered black boxes, meaning their decision making processes are not easily interpretable by humans. Raising concerns about accountability and transparency.

Well, how can you prevent it from doing it again? you gotta be really aware of this stuff going on, people. Saying there's a risk that AI advancements could exacerbate existing social and economic inequalities if access to AI technology or benefits from AI development is not distributed equitably. And if you don't get up off your ass and do something, and you just have your hand out and say, I deserve it. That's where the whole entitlement generation is coming from. No, dude. Fortunately, I love pickled radish, so that worked out well. And I did share the love, but I have a recipe that I'm going to put on the site with this beautiful rainbow chard.

And the quality was really quite astonishing. The value was really quite astonishing. and they deliver from in the middle of the night because it comes off the farm. It's so cute! I love it! I'm s I feel more in the country now because I get farm fresh picked vegetables.
